


Chairman's Report





Treasurer's Report

Unfortunately this year the club has made a slight loss, this is mainly due to the lack of CCs in 2014. Although the Back-to-Back shows did make a loss, comparing the new venue to our old one, I am sure you will all agree that the slight deficit is more than justified and hopefully our Championship show profit next year will more than cover the costs of our open shows. However, overall our 3 Open Shows made a small profit.

Affi Magazine was not so well supported, which is very disappointing as in 2013 the magazine saw a small profit and this year it appears on the balance sheet at the lowest level of income since 2010 despite being such a superb asset to the Club, it is clear that support is needed for it to continue.

Subscriptions again were slightly down on last year which reflects the general trend throughout, hopefully regular members might encourage others or those new to the Breed to join the Club.

It was great that the Seminar we held was well supported and gave us a small profit, also our presence with the Breed Club Stand at Crufts brought in some good revenue underlining the need to take the WAHC to this show. As a whole the Club is in good stead and with this year's CCs back with us I am confident that we will have a good year.

The Rescue account has increased overall funds by around 2% however there was no financial outlay as far as rescue is concerned, which is a good thing.

I have been unable to secure short term high interest accounts at the moment so our funds are only receiving minimal interest but I am still looking into this, and hopefully this time next year I can report on a good interest received figure. Thank you all for your continued support.



For me Bath Championship Show fits the bill completely, always


lovely rings, with close parking and not too far up the road!

Venues Ain't Easy!

There are many factors to consider when looking for or booking a venue and the Western have tried many over the past 40 years! At least we don't have to think about benching any more, all we need is location, good space to set up cages and tables, good sized rings, good parking facilities close-by, good floor surface for the dogs to grip on, catering and toilets all wrapped up in an affordable package – not quite so easy to find I'm afraid!

Since the first show location at RAF Hereford, our Championship Shows have been held at Three Counties Showground, Malvern, which at the time was great, however the balance changed because of the introduction of commercial charges for the buildings which now run at over £3k if held between April and October and £1,500 for the winter period!

We tried Bristol Exhibition Centre for a couple of years, they then decided no more dog shows in their exhibition hall. After this we went to the Royal Bath & West Showground for quite a few years which was fine for a while as we got "mates rates" at the time, which was a huge benefit for the Club, although some people moaned that it was off the beaten track, was cold and difficult to get to! That said, the Club did very well out of it!

Next we went to a leisure centre at Weston-Super-Mare which was certainly large enough and location was good, floor though was not ideal and catering abysmal. After this we thought we were in luck, finding the Auction Centre at Easter Compton, just off the M5 near Bristol; good space, good parking, good floor, good catering, reasonable cost, okay for 3 or 4 years, but now they no longer have dog shows and prefer to concentrate on car boot sales, probably more lucrative for them!

So now we have arrived at Taunton, the venue itself is great, very spacious with a brilliant non-slip surface, good parking, good toilets and available catering plus the staff there couldn't be more helpful, okay it could be more ideally situated, but it is close to the M5. We are very limited on available venues, not just in the South-West of England, but it seems to be fairly general unless you are in the Midlands where you can take advantage of the Kennel Club Building or Sky Blue Connexion. Schools are by and large no longer an option for dog shows and we are left with a limited choice which is affordable.

Grooming the Afghan Hound

The Afghan Hound is the king of dogs.

My challenge is to groom and present my Afghan Hounds to a level of excellence that when finished is worthy to meet the lofty majesty of the breed.

When I start grooming I have the essential requirements at hand, a glass of quality Australian dry red wine and any of the stirring operas (Puccini's Madame Butterfly for example) blaring. Now that we have set the mood one can get on in a relaxed euphoria to create something of your own.

With Afghan Hounds the hair is a blessing and at the same time can be a curse. I study closely the dog I am about to present for the ring and look for what the hair enhances and how the hair is hiding the qualities of the dog. My aim is not to change the dog but highlight those qualities and present the hair to enhance what are the breed characteristics.

Grooming Afghan Hounds starts with the trimming.

First

Any cleaning up of excessive hair should be done before bathing There are two reasons for this,

- **1** When fine excessive saddle coat hair is removed it can disturb any dead skin on the surface that appears like dandruff, which is quite unsightly.
- **2** When hair is removed and the dog is not washed after, the remaining hair will be left standing proud and not lay down as intended.

Saddles

The standard states that the hair on the saddle should be short on mature dogs. With quality feeding, care and regular bathing, fine fluff hair will appear in amongst the coarser short saddle hair. For optimum saddle appearance this hair should be removed by thumb and finger. Mechanical methods (shaping Knives, scrapers, clippers etc.) do not work because although they leave the saddle coat short, it leaves the "saddle hair" and the fluff both at the same length. This leaves the overall appearance dull and lacking in lustre. We believe it is an absolute sin to use these mechanical methods on the saddle.

The finger and thumb method is very easy, when done correctly. By pushing the thumb against the grain of the hair, this makes the hair raise up over the thumb, then gently pinch the hair between the thumb and forefinger at the same time pulling backwards away from the hair. Each time you do this a small amount of the fluff comes out, until there is none left and all that is remaining is the coarse short saddle hair. It takes longer than the mechanical methods, but if you want to achieve a glossy smooth saddle, then the time is well spent. Just remember do not try to take too much hair at a time, a little often works best.

A tip: if you cannot handle doing the saddle by hand all at once, complete a section at a time, starting with a centre 50cm strip, from point of shoulder to the tail. Then comeback later and widen till eventually you have "set the Line".

Setting the saddle line is quite easy. Place your hand over the point of shoulder and the side of your hand nearest to the rear is where you start. This starting point is then carried all the way to the tail. This thin line is then widened evenly as you go, until you have gone just lower than the hipbones and to the pelvic bone just below the tail set. You now should have a well-groomed natural saddle.

Your saddle grooming can assist you to present your dog in the best outline shape optically. Should your dog be long in back you can use the saddle grooming to optically present a shorter looking dog and visa versa if your dog is too short in back.

Too long in back – start a little further back from the point of Shoulder, leave the saddle hair fluff on the point of each hipbone and finish the saddling at the point of tail – not below the tail.

The line off the shoulder can drop a little lower off the sideline to form a jockey appearance saddle line.

Too short in back – Start the saddle 2.5.cm closer to the neck, extend the saddle to below the point of tail, drop the line off the shoulder severely and follow the sides of the saddle to he back of the hipbones. Leave some saddle fluff at the back of the hipbones.

Tails

As with the saddling process follow the same procedure (thumb and forefinger) all the way to the end of the tail, leaving the last of the point of tail feathering. Next, following the saddling process down each side of the tail until the only long hair left is coming from underneath the tail. Keep in mind the standard calls for sparse feathering on the tail. So if the remaining hair is profuse – thin all the way to the point of tail. Here I use thumb nail and forefinger to remove the hair in an ever increasing length from the tip of the tail (very short) to the point of tail (quite long) so as to create a fan appearance. This gives the best optical look of "tail long" and "sparsely feathered" whilst balancing the overall natural look of the dog.

Face

The idea is to remove the excessive hair from the cheeks back to the ears, under the jaw line and a short way down the throat. You can remove the excess face hair with clippers, scissors or even by hand. Remember we are doing this to remove hair that hides the features of the Afghan head and not enhance them. Excessive hair in this area gives the appearances of a short and blockier head. If using clippers make sure the blade you use is no finer than a #10 and always cut the hair with the grain never against it, making the cutting strokes as long as possible so as not to cause "cut" lines that can be seen. Smooth clean strokes produce the most natural finish. To gain clean cuts, have the skin taught, hold the dog softly around the muzzle and elevate the muzzle at an angle of 60°. To know where to stop when cutting down the throat, go no further than the start of the Adams apple. Remember your job is to clean away the hair that does not enhance the head and achieve it naturally.

Neck

Excessive (boofy) hair at the back of the neck also gives a false impression of how long the neck really is, so this needs to be thinned to realise the true neck.

By removing the fluff hair on the neck patches by the same finger and thumb method as with the saddle, allows the remaining hair to lie down on to the neck presenting a natural look of the shawl but without the thickness.

A point to remember. If you take out hair at the back of the neck then you must balance this by thinning any thickness from the front of the neck. You should achieve this using the same finger and thumb method, pulling the hair out with one hand and with finger and thumb of the other pull hair gently out from the holding hand. Starting from just above the pro sternum, thinning by layers 5cm apart up to the throat. Follow this same procedure around each side of the neck and up to the throat. This layering thinning allows the remaining coat to sit down flat against the throat.

Turn of Stifle

Excess hair at the rear of the back legs can fill in the movement of the turn of stifle giving the appearance of a dog with a straight behind.

From the rear with one hand I pull the hair away that is laying on the rear of the turn of stifle, pulling it to the rear of the dog then with the other hand I gently tease the excess hair out of my holding hand all the way up to just below the tail. I brush the remaining hair back down and if necessary repeat the process until the hair from the pelvic bone down the length of the back of the first thigh is lying flat. This leaves the hair at the back of the first thigh sitting flat and therefore accentuating the movement of the turn and the protrusion of the second thigh to the point of hock. Many make the mistake of removing and shaping the hair in the front of the back leg, this is unnecessary if the rear of the back leg is done properly.

Washing

Now all the prep work is done the washing is easy.

For ultimate results use a shampoo that removes the oil from the hair and leaves little or no residue. We use "Plush Puppy" Shampoo with Primrose oil. After every four washes we use a human semi stripping shampoo (a clarifyer), to completely remove any build up of conditioner, show sprays and oil, to assist the goal of total hair separation. The major point when washing is to be thorough and make sure all the shampoo is rinsed out completely.


Following the washing, rinse through a concentrate crème conditioner, (we use Plush Puppy) at approx. 30ml per 5 litres of water and run through the entire coat. An easy way to get the legs completely conditioned is to put them in the conditioner bucket then rinse over with a dipper. Also utilise the dipper to fully condition the ear fringes by dunking them into the solution.

Starting at the head begin lightly rinsing the coat with clean water

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to remove at least half if not all the conditioner (even more in winter). A hydra bath is the ultimate bath to ensure the washing and the conditioning process is thorough and reaches everywhere. Towel dry excess water and you are ready for drying.

Drying

The aim is to separate and not over heat any part of the coat. Drying the coat horizontal from the top down allows the lower wet coat to also start drying and brushing against the wind of the dryer achieves the maximum hair separation and the quickest drying. When brushing (I have changed after all these years) I now use a method of brushing in slow motion directing the hair outwards with brush, holding to allow the drying air to pass through then brush the coat down. By this method you will dry the coat evenly and keep the hair separating although you feel it is slow it actually is as fast as any other method and takes out very little hair.

A tip: Keep going back over what you have done to keep the separation as the coat cools.

Always brush the saddle coat with the grain and brush the saddle edges with the grain and then the side coat downwards.

The back leg coat is down and forward whilst the hock and feet coat is brushed up.

We use a Mason Pearson bristle and nylon junior size brush from wet to dry then a soft-based long pin brush to go right through the coat after the drying process to ensure every hair is aerated and separation is complete.

A tip: Most Afghans do not appreciate you brushing their feet, especially their front feet. Don't get cross at their avoidance, just persist. Brush in slow motion, brushing rapidly just accentuates their agitation. When they lift the foot you are brushing, calmly brush the other foot and visa versa, continue until your dog gives up (not you) and seize the moment thank your dog (GOOD DOG). Be patient, if they want to lift their feet again just keep going – remember if you do not give up, they will.

At the show

Always remember, performance before preparation.

It is no good having a beautifully presented dog that does not perform.

At the show, grooming relies on the work being done at home. The aim of grooming at the show is to separate every hair and so when the dog has completed any ring manoeuvre and comes to a halt the hair falls back into place enhancing the outline and the characteristics of the dog.

Preparing for the ring we brush through the coat firstly with the Mason Pearson and providing moisture by way of a spray using a diluted solution of water and "The STUFF", then finally the long pin brush with the total aim of coat separation.

At shows when there is hot drying wind we utilise a higher concentration ratio of the "The STUFF" in another spray bottle. But if the weather condition is cold and damp, only a very fine spray is needed, sometimes none at all in these conditions.

In the ring the need for brushing is highly diminished by the prep work at home and the effort at ringside.

I take a medium length soft base pin brush into the ring and try to limit my ring brushing to only ensuing the coat does not detract from the dogs characteristics ie; neck coat, turn of stifle, ears etc. I believe the ring is for concentrating on exhibiting my dog and not for another grooming session.

Great coat presentation only requires patience and an aim for excellence.

40 Years Ago...

40 years ago the BIS winner of our Championship show was CH MUCMUL-GEE OF JABIGANDAL, a black/tan dog. The dog classes were judged by Dennis McCarthy (Pooghan). 'Bully' was owned and shown by Marion Newitt (Kamiren), he was born in 1967 and gained his title in 1975, gaining subsequent CCs at SWKA under John Bland and his crown with BOB under Pauline Leyder at Belfast.

When mated to **Pollyanna of Kabella** (bred by Ann Allan) there was a litter of five, from which came **Kamiren Canterbury Belle** owned by Julie Speck who eventually bred from her in 1980, under her Shullimar affix to the black/tan **Ch Karnak Shamrock**. This then became the foundation for Ron and Christine Morgan who had **Shullimar Maybelline of Ellistine**; then there was **Ch Shullimar Rainbow Warrior** owned by Stan Szyczewski and **Shullimar Super Trouper at Tazieff** owned by Cindy Heal. These lines still retained the Horningsea, Khorrassan, Carloway and Pooghan lines, but now also introduced the Amudaryas through **Ch Amudarya Shalar** (Shamrock's sire).

Super Trouper was used by Lesley and Alan Busby producing

ch Wilbus Hanukah from the union between him and their Kanjanelli bitch (a blend of Van de Oranje Manege and Moonswift lines), bred by Janet Hemsley.

Sadiq of Kushbudar, Maybelline produced Ch Ellistine A Star is Born, owned by Ron and Peggy Clifford, and moving on from there, he sired a litter to Ch Palamedees Anaja of Calamayor for Dave and Thereséa Grist, this produced the Champion brothers: Ch Calamayor Glyndwr (owned by the Cliffords) and Ch Calamayor Thor (owned by Geoff and Angela Stevens) – quite a dynasty!

Early Imports

The early imported Afghan hounds were frequently divided into the Bell-Murray hounds and the Ghazni hounds. Major Bell-Murray obtained his first Afghan in India in 1913. He imported his dogs into Scotland in 1921. Cove Kennels was managed by Miss Jean Manson, and the dogs later passed into her ownership.

held the spotlight

The Bell-Murray hounds were first on the scene in the UK, and held the spotlight until the emergence of the Ghazni Afghans, imported by Major and Mrs Mary Amps in 1925. Most of the Ghazni dogs came from the area around Kabul, Afghanistan, and were said to be mountain type, ie; more heavily built, closer-coupled, and with a denser coat.

The early years in the formation of a breed are the most important because the breeding population is often so small that each breeding decision can have a huge impact on those that are bred latterly. It is often said, that the Afghan Hound is a blend of two types of dog; the desert type and mountain type.

foundation of the breed

The so called desert type is generally attributed to being a lesser coated, taller dog than the more compact, heavily coated mountain type. People today tend to think of those two types as being represented by the two major kennels at the foundation of the breed – Bell-Murray (desert type) and Ghazni (mountain type).

The idea of a blending of types may be more of a romantic notion than one rooted in reality, but it is a fact that the Ghazni's or mountain type made much more of an impact on the overall population than the Bell-Murray's during the 50s, 60s and 70s, but is that true of today's breeding? Many of the present day hounds

are becoming taller, finer specimens and probably quite representative of those Bell-Murrays.

Many of us are familiar with the rivalry between those two early kennels during the 1920s. Major Bell-Murray arrived on the scene first with his collection of Afghan Hounds. They were the attraction of the day and the fanciers of the time

would have made them their first port of call for any puppies. This was to be short-lived as soon afterwards Mrs Amps came on the scene with her very famous hound – **Ch Sirdar of Ghazni.**

Mrs Amps gathered some of the enthusiasts at the time to form an Afghan Hound Association and the success of the overall look of Sirdar and his use at stud made dramatic changes in the breed, which would appear to have almost wiped out the remaining Bell-Murrays.

obvious differences

If you are at all a fan of Afghan Hounds, you must at least have a copy of some of the notable books on Afghan Hounds, there have been many on the subject. There are loads of photographs of these dogs which will illustrate the obvious differences between the two strains.

Yet the Afghan hounds being bred today, are probably getting far closer to the 'desert type' than to the 'mountain type' and yet 'type,' flexible as it seems to be, remains rooted in the history of this wonderful breed.
